Research activity

My research defines quasi-experimental settings to try and understand the effects of the quality of public institutions on domestic economic development and political stability. I conclude that accountability is crucial for states to build a credible reputation, and consequently to realise growth-enhancing interventions in the economy by interacting with the private sector. In contrast, unregulated discretion strengthens inefficient power imbalances.

General contribution

Beyond the specificities of each paper, my research brings a unified contribution to the economic literature. It shows that checks and balances and the rule of law are values of legal philosophy that preserve political stability and have positive implications on development. On the one hand, they make the public sector more predictable and credible in the eyes of private actors, thereby facilitating the cooperation of the two. On the other hand, they slim the chances for discretion and its distortionary effects.

I implement a combination of DID and RDD to analyse the possibility of patronage in the proximity of the Italian regional elections. To this purpose, I observe the path of discretionary hiring linked to the exogenous vote deferral caused by the Covid-19 pandemic. Such deferral only concerns the treated group, which is composed of seven regions initially scheduled to vote during the spring of 2020. There, the probability that new public employees come from the same region where the hiring office is located shrinks immediately after the elections are postponed. The same outcome surges again by a similar magnitude as soon as the updated election date is announced. In contrast, no differences are observed at the same thresholds in the control group - which was not called to vote in the spring of 2020. Since locally-born employees have the right to vote in the hiring region, patronage may have been at play by distorting the discretionary job allocation in the regional offices.

I apply spatial RDD to study the variation across the colonial regimes that were defined by the British within the present-day state of Madhya Pradesh, India. The treated group is characterised by state institutions that implemented standardised practices in public administration. Over the long run, these have produced better average development outcomes than protectorates, whose rulers' discretionary power faced fewer limits. Indeed, the institutional framework in the treated group incentivised private investment by land owners, and was instrumental to a higher influx of capital, which made infrastructure construction possible. However, as redistribution did not

fall within the aims of that administration, higher inequality has also realised in the treated group.

Among other activities, I have defined a research project concerning an Indian princely state ruled by four consecutive queens at the time of British colonisation. This is a unique characteristic, which came with the promotion of proto-feminist views by those queens. Thus, I enquire whether there is an institutional origin of female empowerment. I proxy the latter by some measures of within-couple bargaining power surveyed at current times. Applying a spatial RDD along the border between this and two other princely states that were traditionally ruled by men, it seems that women from the treated group have a higher age at first union, and a better match between the actual and desired number of children.

Or are they more expert in the field, hence capable of delivering more efficient administration? Even if the first component does not seem dominant in the short term, the deterioration of public policy outcomes becomes clearer as more time elapses from the election of a dynastic ruler.
